Multiple Choice Pre-Reading Strategies

- Identify number of passage, determine questions per passage, and estimate minutes per passage.
- Scan each passage for year of publication, genre, culture/language cues.
- Label passages (pre-20th century poetry, pre-20th century prose, 20th century poetry, 20th century prose).
- Determine order for tackling passages based on confidence with type/time period.

Multiple Choice Reading Strategies

- For each passage, **box** the questions related to big-picture questions (theme, tone, characterization).
- For each question, **circle** specific literary concepts and underline the task (usually marked by active verb).
- For each question, [bracket] the line(s) and mark with the question number.
- For each question that mentions specific line(s), underline those lines in the passage, and mark the question number.

Multiple Choice Reading Strategies

- **Allow questions to guide reading.**

Questions contain clues as to passage's topic, focus, tone, and patterns.

- **Answer out of order.**

Some questions require little in-depth reading; some require much. Questions are in order of their appearance in the passage—not in order of difficulty. Use your time economically.

- **Read all the choices.**

Don't select the first right answer when a later option is better. Choose the best not simply a correct answer.

- **Guess wisely.**

Determine your own answer before examining the choices OR—more typically—use process of elimination (and cross out the choices you know are wrong). Focus on the question's wording.

- **Understand tone.**

Identify answer choices by positive (+), negative (-), or neutral/ironic (~) tone, and eliminate all those that do not fit immediately.

Pay particular attention to the verb of the question:

Multiple Choice Answering Strategies

- Use the questions you boxed (theme, tone, characterization) as your primary guides. All other questions should match these big-picture questions.
- Answer questions out of order: diction and individual-line questions first, EXCEPT questions last.
- Use process of elimination, and literally cross through wrong choices.
- Bubble only at end of each page (not question by question).
