- 1. Consider the <u>complexity</u> of the Marxist <u>theme</u> found in the interactions between Utterson and Poole throughout this chapter? Begin with their conversation on the opening pages.
- 2. How do the details of the <u>setting</u> and the <u>characterization</u> of Utterson and Poole help to contribute to the overall sense of <u>suspense</u> in this chapter?
- 3. List at least five specific Gothic <u>details</u> in this chapter and explain why they are Gothic. How do these <u>Gothic elements</u> affect the novella's overall structure?
- 4. How does the repeated use of "thing," "it," and "creature" in this chapter suggest Darwinian ideas?
- 5. Examine the pivotal role of the <u>motifs</u> of the key and door in this chapter. When Utterson and Poole breach the door, how does what they discover not meet their expectations?
- 6. At the end of the chapter how does Stevenson alter the <u>narrative</u> <u>structure</u> and <u>point-of-view</u> with the "three enclosures"? How do these elements allow for the narrative to conclude?
- 7. Identify connections to 19th century ideologies (-ism).
